**Oak Orchard Health** had its start in 1973 with 3 cots separated by curtains in an Albion storefront. Initially funded via a University of Rochester grant to serve migrant farm laborers, from the beginning it was recognized that agricultural workers were not the area's only underserved population. Those whose incomes were low, the uninsured or underinsured, the elderly, and children all came under the Oak Orchard umbrella.

Today, we are truly a community health center and provider of choice, with about 40% of our 16,000 patients having private insurance and yet choosing Oak Orchard over a wide variety of options. We think that speaks well of how far we have come.



## PRIDE Project uses Lean Six Sigma for corporate process improvement



Oak Orchard Health created the PRIDE ("People Rapidly Improving Daily Events")
Initiative, which includes classroom Lean and Six Sigma training by Bob Lukaszonas of RML Lean Inc., coupled with projects work. Over 40 staff participated over 7 months in our first training group, and 37 earned certification.
Some of the projects included: improving

cervical cancer screening, tracking, and follow-up; improving clinical workflow; improving front desk processes and customer service; streamlining forms; improving purchasing and inventory management; and improving and expanding care management services to additional vulnerable populations. This first PRIDE training was supported by a HRSA QI Supplemental grant for PCMH and Performance Improvement.

## Strives for Migrant Health, Breast Cancer Research, African Poor

t was 1968, and Karen Watt was pregnant with her first child in Albion. Her husband grew tomatoes and Watt had the idea of selling some from a card table across from Albion's historic cemetery. That extra money paid for a dryer for the family's laundry. Then she started taking vegetables to the Rochester Public Market. She picked the tomatoes, shined them, and then made the sale. "I loved it, I got hooked on retail," she recalled.

In the 45 years since her debut selling tomatoes, Watt has travelled the world sharing her expertise in direct marketing and value-added retail. She was president of the North American Farmers Direct Marketing Association, which put her in its "Hall of Fame." OIC International, an NGO, brought her in to visit rural African villages in three countries. She helped poor farmers and their families brainstorm ways to get more money for products. Watt left the villages with lengthy to-do lists. She stressed presentation of the products. For example, she suggested to women in Guinea that they sell produce from a table, not a blanket on the ground. She saw the potential in farmers working together to brand organic beef from the country. Each assignment had unique challenges and opportunities.

Twenty-five years ago, Watt and her husband Chris, were at the forefront in Western New York's agri-tourism movement. The couple had been selling fruit at farmers' markets in the region. They decided to open their own market in Albion. (They continue to sell at seven markets in seven counties.)

Watt Farms Country Market on Route 98 north of the Erie Canal has grown to include a playground, gift shop, and extensive U-pick operation. The Watts purchased and refurbished a tractor-powered train that takes visitors

into the orchards to pick fruit. "Watt's Orchard Express" is popular every fall for students, who visit from WNY schools to learn about agriculture and food. "They take the train ride, learn how to pick apples, and put apples in the press to make cider," Watt said. "And they get the bee pollination lesson." While on the farm markets are common these days in WNY, the Watts and their push to bring people to their farm was unusual in 1987, when the market opened. "They were among the first in the region to recognize an opportunity in agri-tourism and weren't afraid to let the general public on their farm," said Dean Norton, president of New York Farm Bureau.

Watt, 70, grew up in Amherst, attended Amherst High School and was a star athlete. She later graduated from Ithaca College as a math major with a minor in physics. While at Ithaca, she dated Dennis Kirby, a Cornell student. The two married and settled at Kirby's vegetable farm in Albion. Watt remarried Chris Watt 30 years ago. Today, with her husband, she owns over 200 acres of fruit.

The couple has been leaders in Farm Bureau. Mrs. Watt was the Orleans County president and served on the state board. She sends Dean Norton, the current New York Farm Bureau (NYFB) president, frequent emails. While she was on the state board about a decade ago, she was an advocate for the fruit industry and direct markets, pushing for better insurance programs for fruit growers and research dollars for the industry.

In recent years, Norton can count on Watt to advise the organization about changes in funding and policies for migrant health programs. Watt is chairwoman of Oak Orchard Health, which operates primary care health centers in Albion, Brockport and Lyndonville, including a mobile unit to labor camps and a mobile dental unit to



8 schools in 2 counties. She also served on the National Advisory Council on Migrant Health, including a year as its chairwoman. She is currently on the board of the National Center of Farmworker Health and will receive the 2013 Outstanding Migrant Health Center Board Member Award from the National Association of Community Health Centers. "Karen has been very good at state and national

accomplishment.

Watt has turned that experience into a mission to raise money for the American Cancer Society. Nine months after she was diagnosed in 2005, she and her husband hosted the first Making Strides Against Breast Cancer Orchard Walk at their farm. The event has continued every October

levels, pushing for issues in migrant health," Norton said. "She makes sure those issues are represented at the state level. We rely on her." Watt says health services need to be a priority for farmworkers, who are often young men from foreign countries. "We want healthy employees. Because they migrate, it's difficult for them to keep records and maintain a continuity of care." The migrant health centers are strategically located to provide care for this population.

She has pushed Oak Orchard Health to open a new center in Warsaw, Wyoming County this year. All of Oak Orchard's centers are open to the public and serve insured and uninsured in what are called "medically underserved" areas. Rural areas often have a shortage of doctors and many barriers to access to excellent medical care, she said. Oak Orchard Health serves over 16,000 patients each year with over 60,000 individual appointments.

Watt knows personally how access to care can save a life. In January 2005, she was detected with breast cancer. She is a survivor, which she said is her proudest life (this year's walk will take place on October 20), and has raised about \$225,000. The event last year netted \$50,000 and attracted over 1,000 participants. "Somebody has to come up with answers for cancer," Watt said.

She has pushed hard to raise money because she knows some of the dollars will go to local research at Roswell Park Cancer Institute in Buffalo and at the University of Rochester.

Norton marvels at Watt's passion for so many causes, especially her advocacy for breast cancer research." Karen has never been afraid to share her story, whether on the farm, migrant health or her health scare," Norton said. "She has taken lemons and made lemonade out of it. She has thrived. She didn't let it keep her down."
